

Notes:

- (1) ITA will develop a performance management and reporting framework in 2018/19. While new measures are being developed as part of the framework, this performance measure will be based on certificates of qualification, consistent with the methodology used in the February 2017 Service Plan.
- (2) Youth Program Participants is a count of all students who registered in any youth trades program in this school year. If a student registers in two programs in one year (e.g. TRAIN and WORK), they are only counted once.
- (3) Data Source: ITA Direct Access information system.
- (4) Administrative changes to the Hairstylist program in 2016 have resulted in new registrations now counting as foundation registrations rather than apprenticeship, resulting in a reduction of approximately 200 women reporting apprenticeships.
- (5) ITA will develop a performance management and reporting framework in 2018/19. While new measures are being developed as part of the framework, this performance measure will be based on Total Registered Sponsors, consistent with the methodology used in the February 2017 Service Plan.
- (6) Data Source: Since 2012/13 Sentis Market Research has been commissioned by ITA to conduct the survey for this performance measure (formerly called Sponsor Value Index). Data is collected by combined telephone and online surveys. Industry best practices and quality assurance methods are employed throughout the process. Survey analysis includes a margin of error in which the targets must fall.
- (7) The number of Foundation Program students attending a course funded by ITA, excluding Youth Train in Trades students identified as attending post-secondary Foundation Programs.
- (8) This measures the percentage of individuals who successfully complete a Foundation program and become an apprentice registered with the ITA 12 months from their Foundation credential achievement date. This includes results for ITA youth program participants from the Youth Train in Trades and Youth Work in Trades programs.
- (9) A weighted average of both apprenticeship and foundation program post-secondary seat utilization, reflecting percent of ITA-funded seats filled by registered participants.
- (10) Completion rate is a measure of the number of apprentices who have completed their program and obtained their Certificate of Qualification within 6 years of registration. The completion rate is calculated quarterly and then reported on a cumulative basis throughout the year.

ITA has improved its methodology (September 2015) to track youth participating in trades training programs and as a result, participants in the Youth Train in Trades (formerly ACE IT) program are no longer included in the Apprentice registrations count.



Reporting Apprenticeship Registrations by Industry Training Program As of October 31, 2018








Note:




